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# MUSEUM RECEIVES LEGISLATIVE GRANT

n Saturday, April first, Rhode Island State Representative Paul Crowley presented Museum President Vincent Arnold with a check for \$3,000, representing a grant from the House of Representatives. These funds will help the Museum carry out its research of records and archives that will help document the history of Irish immigrant servants in service with the many Newport mansions over the years.

The Museum's proposal reads, in part: "For over 150, years Irish immigrants worked in the fabled Newport mansions as cooks, gardeners, valets, coach drivers. They lived, for the most part, in the nearby Fifth Ward where they nurtured a strong sense of community and contributed significantly to the fabric of the City of Newport."

Representative Crowley presented the check to the assembled Museum Board as the members attended a strategic planning session.


### FIFTIETH ANNIVERSITY

CONGRATULATIONS are in order for Rev. George B. McCarthy on the 50th anniversary of his ordination. Father McCarthy, Pastor of historic St. Mary's Church, attended St. Kieran's College Seminary in Kilkenney and was ordained June 3,1956 at St. Mary's Cathedral, Kilkenney.

Father McCarthy came to the United States in September, 1956 and became Pastor of St. Mary's in 1976. St. Mary's has had only twelve pastors, including its first, Rev. James Fitton, who assumed the post in 1828. With 30 years of service at St. Mary's, Father McCarthy has the longest tenure in the Parish's 178 year history.

eremonies were held on Saturday, March fourth to establish "Fifth Ward Square" in Newport. The area, from the southern end of Thames Street at Carroll Avenue to Old Fort Road, is now officially known as "Fifth Ward Square", with appropriate signage at each intersection.

City Councilwoman Colleen A. McGrath sponsored the resolution creating the Square, and organized the celebration, which included a "Fifth Ward Outing" at the Hibernian Hall. Museum Board members Joyce Botelho and Pat Murphy researched the origins of the Fifth Ward, combing through the many City of Newport directories and other documents, including a *Newport Daily News* article of May 6, 1898, to ascertain the true bound-

aries and evolution of the Fifth Ward. They found that the first City charter of 1784 was in effect for only three years. Under that first charter there were only four wards and the area now known as the Fifth Ward was designated as the First Ward. The first charter was rescinded in 1787 due to a squabble with Nicholas Easton over the use of Easton's Beach. The city charter was finally restored in 1853, and which time the area now considered the Fifth Ward was established. It included the area south of what is now Memorial Boulevard.

Several changes to the Fifth Ward boundaries occurred with the City's changing population over the next 77 years. Boundaries were changed in 1883, 1892, 1920, and finally in 1929. In 1930, Ward Five was eliminated and the City of Newport consisted of four wards.

n fulfillment of its "Irish Books for Newport County Schools" program, the Museum recently delivered sets of books on Irish history and culture to eleven area middle and high schools. The books cover a range of topics, from Irish history, to Irish music and poetry.

The project began in 2000 when several sets of books were purchased and reviewed by Museum members. Two sets of books, one for the middle schools and one for high schools were selected and procured. This past February and March several Museum board members, led by Shannon Buss, contacted the schools in Newport County and arranged to meet with the librarians to present the books.

Book sets were donated to: Tiverton Middle and High Schools; Portsmouth Middle and High Schools; Middletown's Gaudet Middle School and High School; Newport's Thompson Middle School and Rogers High School; The Lawn Street School in Jamestown; All Saint's Academy in Middletown; and Cluny School in Newport. Board member Joe McEnness had previously donated a set of books to St. Philomena School, located in Portsmouth.
