Dr. Schultz is the co-editor of: *Salem, Myth and Memory*, and the author of "Fire and Roses: The Burning of the Charlestown Convent, 1834, (Northeastern Univ. Press, 2002)

DR. SCHULT'S OCTOBER TALK IS TITLED:
"Mass mailings: The Irish and American Miracles of Prince
Hoheolohe, 1823-24"

In March 1824, Ann Carbery Mattingly, of Washington, was cured from breast cancer, allegedly by Prince Alexander Hohenlohe, a German priest and miracle-worker in Europe. News of the Prince's miracles had reached America following a series of cures in Ireland, and the Prince had sent his instructions for obtaining the cures to Washington through the mail- as early form of "Mass" mailing. This presentation explores the connection between the Irish cures and what became of the Capital Miracle, the unexplained cure of Mrs. Mattingly in 1824.
